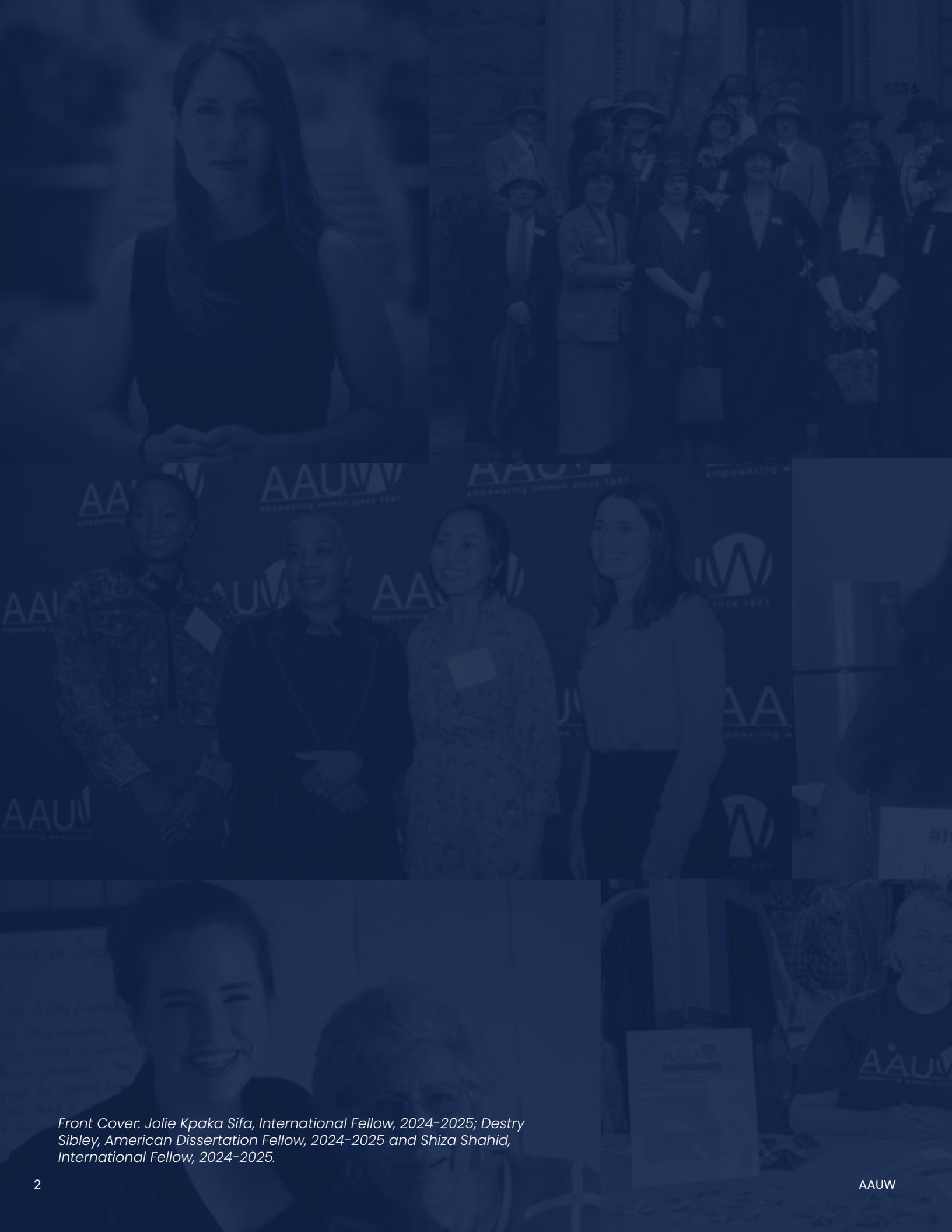

We empower women and girls by championing their success in higher education and pushing for bold policy solutions to create lasting change.

For more than 140 years, AAUW has led the fight for gender equity in higher education and beyond. With a strong record of advocacy and action, AAUW continues to break barriers and defend the rights of women in education and the workplace.

Though we are nonpartisan, we are not values-neutral: We fight to remove the barriers and biases that stand in the way of gender equity. AAUW provides critical funding and support to advance equity in education and improve the lives of women and girls both in the U.S. and internationally. And we advocate for federal, state, and local laws and policies to ensure equity and end discrimination.



STRATEGIC PLAN

In 2025, we launched a bold new Strategic Plan that reaffirms our purpose and sharpens our focus. At a time when higher education is under threat and economic barriers persist, we chose to double down on what matters most: ensuring women have the education, resources, and opportunities they need to succeed.

This purpose comes to life when we invest directly in scholars, expand women's leadership, and fight to remove systemic barriers. It shows up in the tireless work of our members and branches, in our advocacy at the national and international levels, and in the way we come together as a community determined to protect and expand rights for women and girls.

Our Strategic Plan gives shape to three key priorities that define how we put our mission into action. Together, they form a roadmap for equity, ambitious in scope and urgent in execution.

Fund Higher Education

We open doors for women scholars by awarding fellowships and grants, reducing financial barriers, and expanding pathways to leadership and research — especially in fields where women remain underrepresented.

Remove Barriers to Success in Education and the Workplace

We champion policies and initiatives that secure women's economic empowerment, close the gender pay gap, and remove barriers to success in education and the workplace. From grassroots advocacy to national policy, we make our voices heard.

Strengthen Our Reach

We build the strength of our branches, members, and national infrastructure to ensure AAUW remains sustainable, influential, and future-focused. By deepening engagement and expanding our network, we amplify our collective impact for generations to come.

- Support college and university students, staff, and faculty with salary negotiation and financial literacy training, and other equity and inclusion efforts.
- Promote inclusive, safe, and accessible educational environments through enforcement of Title IX and other civil rights laws.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY 1: FUND HIGHER EDUCATION

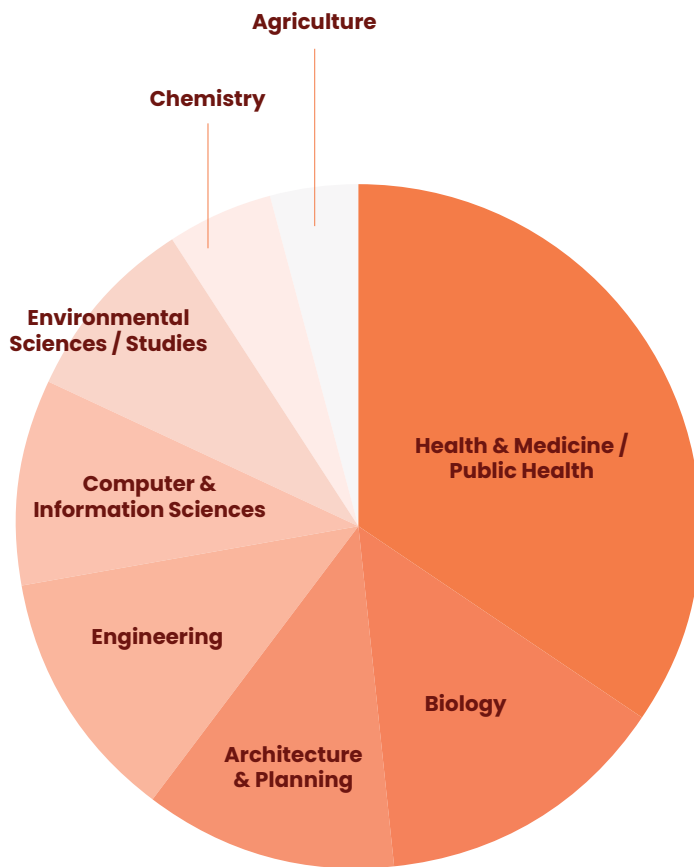
Education is the foundation of equity and the starting point for opportunity, progress, and leadership. For more than a century, we've invested in women scholars and funded their groundbreaking research, leadership, and innovation that continue to shape our world.

In FY25, we awarded fellowships and grants to 256 women and organizations across 40 states and 47 countries. More than half of our recipients pursued doctoral degrees, and nearly 40% advanced research in STEM fields, helping to build a stronger, more diverse academic community.

These investments are more than numbers — they reflect lives changed and communities strengthened. And they are safeguarded by our continued advocacy, from defending Title IX protections to championing student debt relief.

Through this work, we're ensuring that women not only gain access to higher education but are supported to thrive, complete their degrees, and lead in every field they choose.

COMMUNITY ACTION GRANTS & PROGRAMS

GIRLS IN STEM

AAUW Community Action Grants (CAGs) seek to dismantle barriers to girls' participation in STEM and create a pipeline of diverse talent in these fields. CAGs fund innovative, community-based programs that create pathways for K-12 girls to develop STEM confidence, skills, and identity – encouraging them to pursue STEM higher education and careers.

Bright Futures for Youth, STEAM Explorers sparked interest in STEAM careers for rural girls through workshops, field trips, and a capstone STEAM fair.

Girls 4 Science served nearly 500 participants through immersive Saturday academies, with 65% planning to major in STEM – far above national averages.

Self-eSTEM, Early STEM Immersion Program gave 140 girls 168+ hours of robotics, AI, and digital skills training, with 100% reporting increased understanding of AI and product design.

EMPOWERING WOMEN THROUGH INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS

Through partnerships with AAUW Branches and College/University members and including the DC Mayor’s Office on Women’s Policy and Initiatives, Tri Delta, and the Pittsburgh YWCA, AAUW expanded the reach of its Work Smart, Start Smart, and Money Smart programs. These award-winning programs are delivered by webinar and through in person workshops, with consistent requests to offer these programs nationwide.

AAUW Work Smart: Know Your Value and Get Paid is for early and midcareer professionals, focused on negotiating fair salaries, better benefits, and advancement opportunities.

AAUW Start Smart is specifically designed for college women entering the job market, teaching effective salary negotiation techniques to boost confidence and negotiation skills.

AAUW Money Smart is aimed at providing all women with the personal finance information they need to ensure their own financial destiny.

Strategic Priority 2

Remove Barriers to **Success**

STRATEGIC PRIORITY 2: REMOVE BARRIERS TO SUCCESS IN EDUCATION & THE WORKPLACE

Equity doesn't end at graduation. For too many women, the path to success in the workplace is still shaped by systemic barriers — from the persistent pay gap and unaffordable childcare to workplace harassment and threats to civil rights protections.

This year, we took action at every level: equipping women with the tools for economic security, advocating for stronger laws, and mobilizing our grassroots network to ensure every woman and girl has the freedom to learn, work, and lead.

POLICY & ADVOCACY IN MOTION

Following the 2024 election, AAUW stepped up efforts to protect and defend policies that support gender equity.

We launched **Defending Equity: Strengthening Our Collective Impact**, a four-part webinar series that equipped members with policy updates, fundraising tools, in-district advocacy strategies and guidance on scholarship changes — motivating members to request nearly 250 meetings with members of Congress.

To mark the first 100 days of the new administration, AAUW launched our **Pledge for Gender Equity** and released a widely shared explainer on executive actions affecting education, helping advocates focus on what matters most.

AAUW weighed in with Congress and the administration on issues ranging from education to workplace equity, voting rights to civil rights. We submitted comment letters on proposed rules — including Title IX and Public Service Loan Forgiveness — joined a full-page ad in Politico urging Congress to oppose cuts to public education, and signed a letter to state education leaders reaffirming the promise of equal educational opportunity for all students.

When the administration attempted an expedited rollback of Title IX protections through the Department of Energy, AAUW mobilized more than 700 public comments in opposition, demonstrating the power of our advocacy network.

GRASSROOTS POWER

Change happens when voices come together. This year, AAUW launched the **Pledge for Gender Equity**, with over 1,000 people committing to act on day one. Our Lobby Corps expanded with new training sessions and eight Capitol Hill visit days, making sure our perspective was heard where decisions are made.

And through our **It's My Vote!** campaign, branches in 20 states reached thousands of voters, educating communities on ballot measures and ensuring equity was on the agenda from local elections to the national stage.

WOMEN'S ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT IN ACTION

Securing the Future: A Post-Election Conversation on Women's Economic Security

Following the 2024 Presidential Election, we hosted **"Securing the Future"** a policy webinar on women's economic security.

Joined by economists and policy leaders, we highlighted the challenges women face, including shrinking child tax credits to wage inequity. But more importantly, we discussed the solutions we are advancing together.

Nearly 1,000 participants registered.

Honoring AAUW's Legacy with Lilly Ledbetter Film Screening

This year we honored our legacy of fighting for equal pay with a special screening of **Lilly**, the film chronicling Lilly Ledbetter's courageous battle. The conversation that followed – with experts from AAUW and the International Monetary Fund – connected her story to the ongoing global struggle for pay equity, reminding us that the fight is far from over.

IT'S MY VOTE!

AAUW's It's My Vote! voter education campaign empowered communities nationwide to put gender equity on the ballot. Branches in 20 states used AAUW voter guides and tools to reach thousands of voters and educate them on 18 ballot measures in 12 states.

AAUW also served as an anchor partner for the YWomenVote 2024 Gen Z National Town Hall, elevating younger voters' voices in the democratic process.

LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND (LAF)

Founded in 1981 by AAUW members, the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) has provided millions of dollars in support to help level the playing field for individuals advancing gender equity through the legal system.

By offering legal and financial assistance, AAUW empowers survivors and whistleblowers to assert their rights and hold institutions accountable, fostering a culture in which all women can thrive with dignity and opportunity.

OUR GLOBAL OUTLOOK

For more than a century, we have believed that the fight for equity doesn't stop at our borders. Reflected in the international fellows we've funded since 1917 and in our ongoing engagement with partners at the United Nations, our commitment to advancing education and opportunity for women and girls is global.

2025 marked a meaningful moment on the world stage. As the global community commemorated the 30th anniversary of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, AAUW joined delegates, civil society leaders, and partners at the UN Commission on the Status of Women to reaffirm what we know to be true: The work of gender equity remains urgent, unfinished, and deeply interconnected across nations.

We hosted a special NGO CSW69 parallel event, Innovation & Advancement: The Power of Women in STEM, moderated by our CEO, Gloria L. Blackwell and featuring four AAUW alumni whose careers reflect what is possible when women are given the chance to pursue their full potential.

Their message was clear — creating inclusive pathways into STEM is essential to building a more equitable world.

We also supported our Youth Representatives to the United Nations as they brought AAUW's mission into global spaces, leading conversations on women's leadership, peacebuilding, and policy advocacy.

At every level, our presence at the UN underscores a simple belief: Education fuels equity and equity must be a global priority.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY 3: STRENGTHEN OUR REACH

Our greatest strength lies in our people – the members, branches, and donors who carry the mission of equity into their communities every day. Together, they form the backbone of a powerful network that fuels advocacy, supports fellowships, and ensures that our work continues to thrive nationwide.

This year, more than 32,000 members stood with us to advance gender equity in every corner of the country. Strengthening our reach means investing in branches, empowering leaders, and recognizing the generosity that sustains our mission and drives our shared vision for the future.

BRANCHES & MEMBERSHIP

Branches are the heartbeat of our organization – where advocacy meets action and our mission comes to life in real communities. From mentoring the next generation of leaders to advancing local initiatives, our members are the reason AAUW’s impact reaches every corner of the country.

This year, that grassroots power was on full display. We expanded our Lobby Corps with new training sessions and eight visit days in Washington, amplifying our presence in Congress. The Pledge for Gender Equity galvanized more than 1,000 people to take action from day one, while the It’s My Vote! campaign reached voters in 20 states – educating communities on ballot measures and empowering the next generation of advocates.

Together, our branches and members continue to demonstrate that real change starts locally – and grows stronger when we move forward as one.

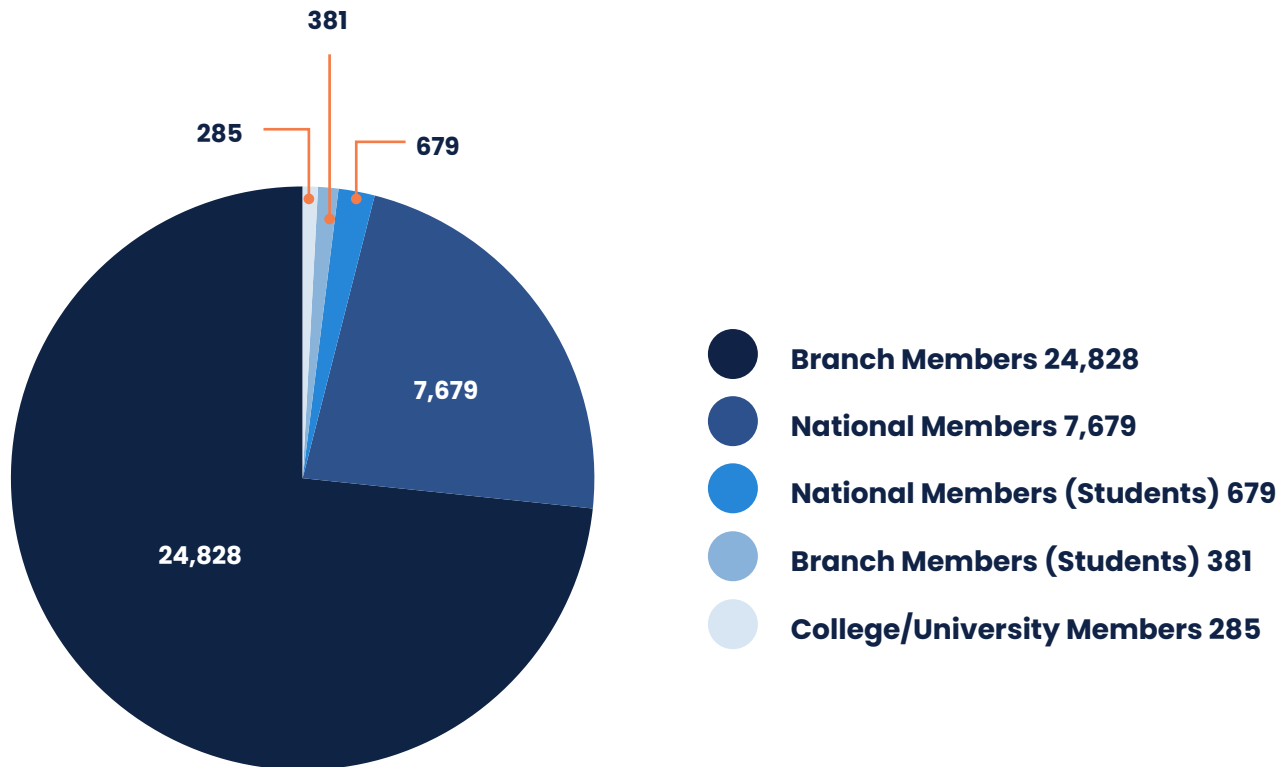

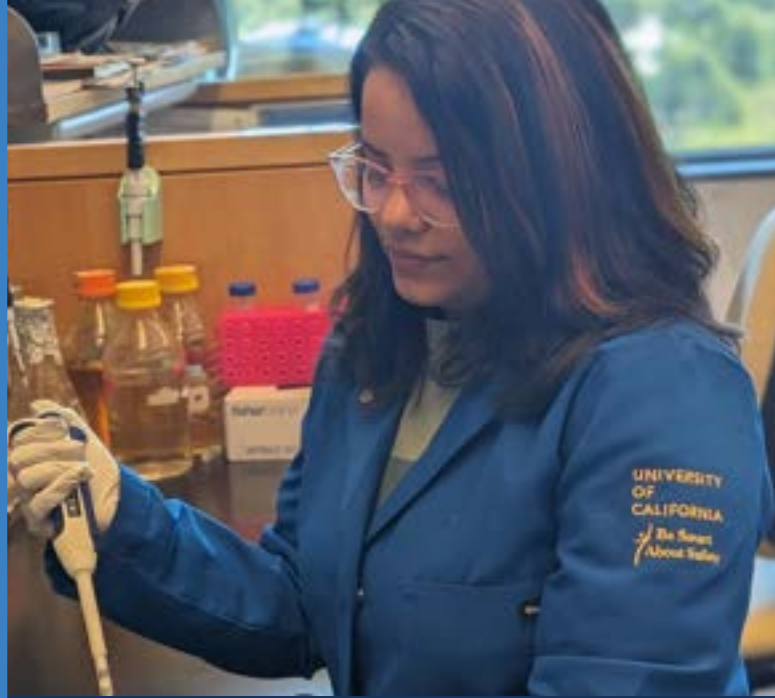

2025 Clean Audit

AAUW once again received a clean audit. Our auditors commended the professionalism and efficiency of our team, as well as our adherence to accounting standards and best practices. To support transparency, three years of financial audits, tax returns, and budgets are available on our website.

A Healthy Endowment

AAUW manages **\$76 million** in endowed funds in alignment with the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA). With this guidance, **\$35 million** in accumulated unspent earnings has been added to preserve the purchasing power of these endowments – bringing total endowed funds under management to **\$111 million**. These endowments generate **\$6 million annually** to support fellowships and grants.

Strong Governance

The Finance Committee meets quarterly, receives monthly updates, and works closely with leadership, including CEO Gloria L. Blackwell. The Board of Directors meets six times a year and collaborates with the Finance, Investment, and Audit Committees to ensure AAUW's financial strength and accountability.

Board Commitment to Balanced Budgets

We remain dedicated to balanced budgets, adherence to accounting standards, and ongoing financial transparency – all of which reinforce sustainability, operational efficiency, and long-term impact.

High Ratings

AAUW earned a 4-star rating from Charity Navigator and a Platinum Transparency Seal from GuideStar, demonstrating our commitment to accountability and best-in-class nonprofit practices.

Declining membership and inflation continue to place pressure on revenue, making sustainability a top priority. Expanding Legacy Circle membership and advancing the Branch Alignment initiative will strengthen giving and support AAUW's financial position.

Greatest Needs Fund (Unrestricted)

While **96%** of AAUW's net assets are donor-restricted for programmatic use, only **4%** are unrestricted. Growing these funds is critical to ensuring AAUW can respond to emerging priorities and support branches, states, and mission-aligned work.

Branch & State Support of AAUW's Mission

Support from AAUW's branches and states is crucial to achieving collective impact for women and girls. Together, our national, state, and branch work on AAUW's mission and strategic priorities, enhances our overall impact.

Rebuilding Reserves

We aim to continue rebuilding reserves — especially **unrestricted funds**, which provide essential flexibility during challenging times.

We continue to build a secure and robust future for our organization, guided by a comprehensive sustainability plan that is regularly evaluated and updated.

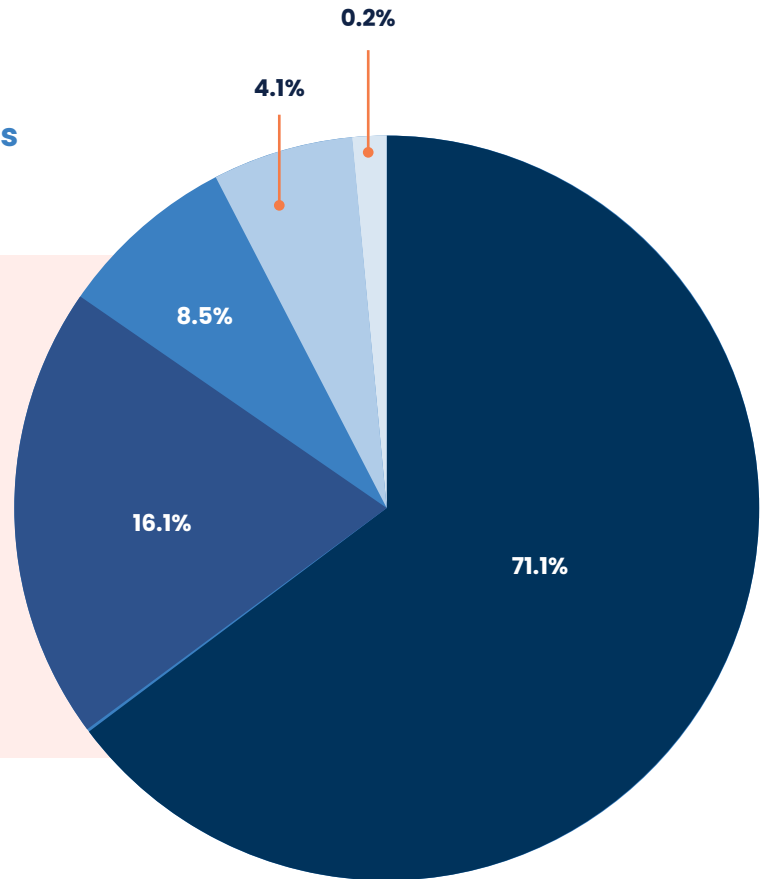

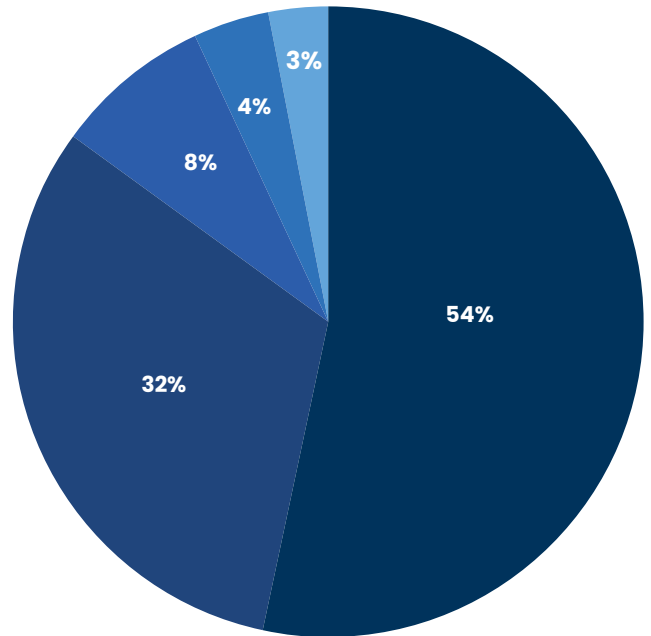

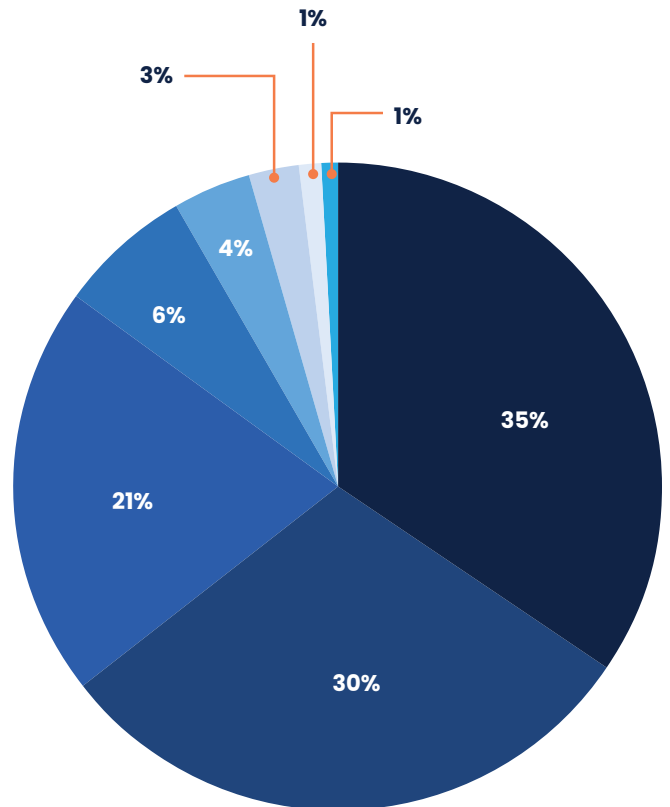

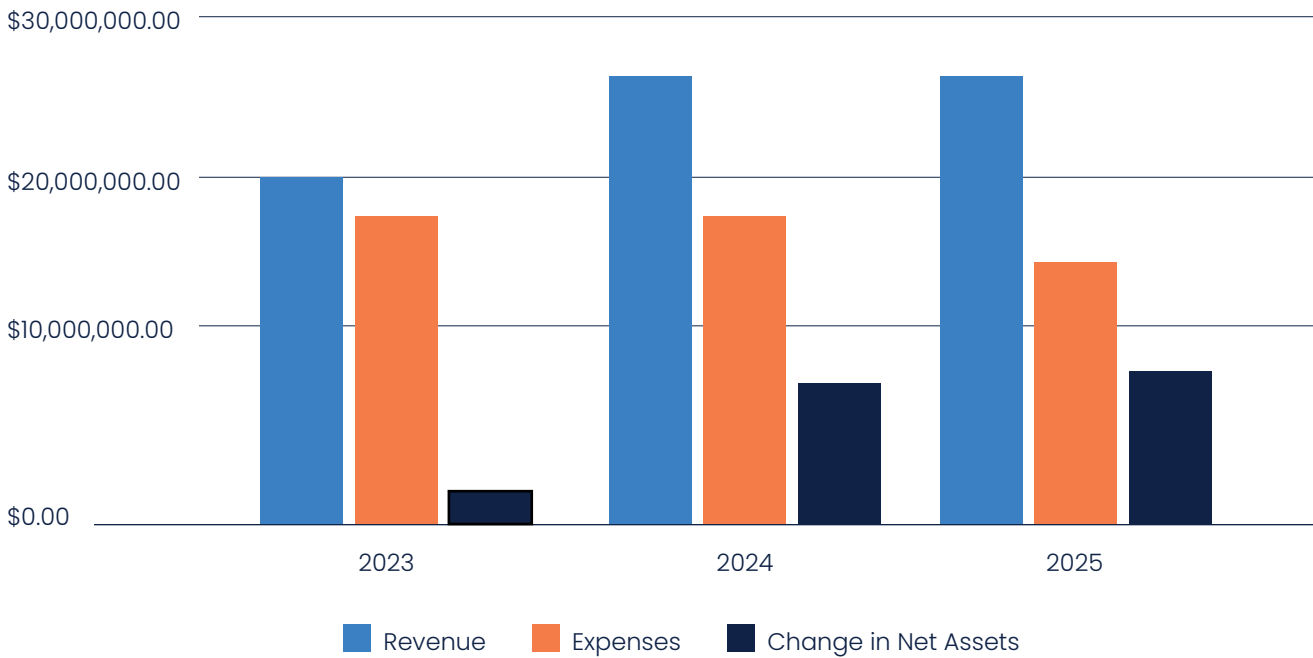
